- May 23 Our speaker will be physics professor and astronomer Michael De Leonardis. He will speak on the NEO's (near earth objects) and the possibility of an earth impact; the new techniques in modern astronomy (not just looking through a telescope) and the Webb Telescope which will replace the Hubble telescope currently in use. Mr. DeLeonardis is a retired astronomer and currently on the faculty as a Professor of Science at Norwalk Community College.
- May 30 Jinger Berry is the Executive Director of the Tully Center, Stamford Hospital's Health & Fitness Institute. Her subject will be Life Style Change, creating a healthy lifestyle "you" can live with. Her talk will help you look at your lifestyles and changes you can make to make daily activities easier and to live a healthier life, including 10 things you can do to look and feel younger in 60 days, fall prevention, and how to get the most out of any exercise or diet program.
