JULY AND AUGUST SPEAKERS (Meetings are at 10:00 a.m. in Morrill Hall, except the August 24 meeting will be at New Canaan High School)

- Jul 13 Alfred G. Gerteiny is Adjunct Lecturer of History at the University of Connecticut in Stamford. He has been a longtime media commentator on the Middle East, Africa, terrorism, and U.S. foreign policy. Professor Gerteiny will discuss the hypothesis of his book, *The Terrorist Conjunction*, in which he addresses the seminal causes of contemporary transnational terrorism. Missing from many contemporary analyses of the causes of terrorism is any mention of the role of U.S. foreign policy, an examination of which is seen by some critics as inherently unpatriotic. Even less attention is paid to the role of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.
- Jul 27 Scott Supernaw will speak to us on the future of travel. As Vice-President Sales and Marketing, Supernaw oversees the development and implementation of the Marketing and Sales strategies for Tauck World Discovery. Mr. Supernaw brings rich and extensive experience in global marketing and business development from well-established brands in the travel industry. The companies he has worked with include TWA, General Mills Inc., and Olson-Travelworld Ltd.
